We are **less than three months** from this year's Show and Sale. That means it's time to get started and get going! One of our first tasks is to set up committees, and here's our list of tasks and projects:

Committee Descriptions:

Publicity: Publicize the S&S in social media, print and broadcast media, garden centers, and hobby groups.

Food truck: Book one or two food trucks for S&S attendees.

Food: Provide food for volunteers during the event.

Beer Flats: Find cardboard beer flats for attendees to carry their purchases.

Cash Register: Ring up sales and take payment for all purchases.

COLORADO HOME & GARDEN SHOW

We have been invited to partner with Wild Ones Front Range (WOFR) for a booth at the Colorado Home and Garden Show. The plan is to increase our visibility in the metro area for both organizations and to promote our message of conservation. ((Plus, it's a get opportunity to advertise for the 2022 Show and Sale!)) If you are new to Wild Ones, here is the club's introduction from their website:

"Wild Ones: Native Plants, Natural Landscapes promotes environmentally sound landscaping practices to preserve biodiversity through the preservation, restoration and establishment of native plant communities. Wild Ones is a not-for-profit environmental education and advocacy organization founded in 1979." Click here to check out the Wild Ones website!

We need volunteers at the booth! Duties include greeting the public, promoting our clubs, and answering questions about cactus and succulents. We will have handouts and running slide shows to show examples and where to buy quality plants. We will run cactus and succulent pictures on monitors and use QR codes to let the public download the relevant handouts at their convenience. We need to have two people (one from each Club) at all times in the booth while the Show is open.

WHAT'S "IN IT" FOR THE VOLUNTEER?

- 1. You get a free pass into the Show. Volunteers can come early and tour the Show before their shifts begin or stay late and tour the Show after the end of their shift. More than 500 exhibitors and eight landscaped gardens (over one acre in total) are at this year's Show. The free pass saves \$10 to \$12 per day.
- 2. You will have the chance to talk to the region's best gardening gurus and home improvement experts at the Show at a time of your choice.
- 3. Staffing this booth for a shift is the fastest way for Native Plant Masters to meet the CSU requirement for educational contacts. You can earn a full year of educational contacts in a one-weekend shift.
- 4. You get to spread the word about CCSS, our mission, locations to see cactus in local parks and gardens, greenhouses, and vendors where quality and cold-hearty plants can be purchased and provide helpful education to people passionate about gardening.Click here to volunteer on SignUp Genius website!

The Colorado Home and Garden Show runs from February 12th through the 20th. Hours are from Noon to 7:00 PM, Monday through Friday, and 10:00 AM to 7:00 PM on Saturday and Sunday. Our booth is #100 in the northwest corner of the 2nd-floor convention hall. We would love to have you staff our booth and volunteer to help us with outreach to interested gardeners. And if you were wondering, all COVID protocols will be followed as suggested by the City and County of Denver.

Discounted parking is available at Empower Field/Mile Hi Stadium (Lot C) for \$5 per day. There are free shuttle buses that run continuously throughout each day, starting one hour before opening and ending one hour after closing. There is parking in an indoor lot immediately next door, but that will cost more, estimated at \$10 or more for all or part an entire day. Light Rail is also an option since the D and H lines stop at the Convention Center. The train from Arvada (B line) and Westminster (G line) stops at Union Station, and a free mall shuttle will take people to 16thand California Streets with a two-block walk to the Convention Center.

If you want to buy tickets for friends and family members, "2 tickets for the price of 1 admission ticket" is offered on weekdays. The coupon is attached to this note so you can print it and take to the Show box office to buy the 2-for1 tickets.

TEXAS BULL NETTLES: WHY DO THEY HATE US?

Texas Bull Nettle (*Cnidoscolus texanus*) is a species feared across its native range of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, and south/east Texas. Almost all of the above ground parts of the plants are covered in long hollow stinging hairs. When plants are brushed against or handled incorrectly, the tips of the hairs break off and the irritating fluid within the hair is introduced under the skin by its needle-like point.

Despite having the common name of Bull Nettle, these plants are actually in the Euphorbia family where they were first described as *Jatropha*. They are now known to be in their own genus which as been found to be the sister group to *Manihot* (Cassava). While it might be surprising to hear that such a painful plant is closely related to a common food source, the two genera actually share a number of characteristics. They both have large tuberous roots (it's a caudiciform!) and broad palmately compound leaves. There is even another species of *Cnidoscolus* (*C. aconitifolius*) whose leaves are commonly eaten in Southern Mexico, although they have to be cooked to destroy the stinging hairs and the toxins they contain.

In the micrograph below (Fig. 2) you can see a cross section of the stem with a focus on a single stinging hair. The hair is in oblique section which means that it is cut diagonally to the elongated axis. This is why it appears as an oval. The cell wall of the stinging cell is stained read meaning its made of very hard material. In addition to the stinging hairs, the plants also have smaller, multicellular non-stinging hairs (Fig. 3).
