2026 Show and Sale Notes

As you might imagine, we are busy preparing for this year's Plant Show and Sale! Here are a few of the things that are happening:

- We are editing the Show Rules to add clarity. Last year, we had folks entering multiple plants into individual species categories. The rules specify only one plant per category. We will expand this to three plants per species, as that's the most ribbons that can be awarded for each category. This year we'll ask plant exhibitors to respect this rule.
- We try to have a 5 pm cut-off time for entering plants in the Show. Please, if possible, have your entry cards completed in advance!
- Members in good standing will be able to and invited to participate in the Member's sale Friday Night. Any member who arrives at 5 pm for the Member's Sale will be welcome to check out and choose plants before we admit the general public Saturday morning.

That's the heavy stuff. However, other items that you should be aware of include:

- Volunteer! The 2026 Volunteer Sign-Up Genius webpage should be active as you're reading this newsletter
- Start collecting beer flats and small boxes for guests shopping for plants. With two hands a guest will select two plants. But a guest with a box will often fill that box with plants! Those boxes are an important part of the sale.
- Please start prepping your plants for the Plant Show! My plants are starting to break dormancy and I suspect your plants are also starting to show "signs of life", if not starting to bloom! The Plant Show is an important part of this event as it gives guests a look at what their plant could become. *Oh, and winning ribbons is cool.* This includes finding boxes and containers to transport your plants to and from the Fairgrounds! Remember, it snowed last year and history tends to repeat itself!
- Hopefully, as you read this, I'll have the volunteer Sign-Up on the website ready to go! So please start thinking of how you'd like to volunteer and get ready to sign up.

CCSS Monthly Plant Show - Pedro Galvez

The Rules:

The mini shows are a way to up member engagement and to get them excited to show their plants in the Judged Show in April.

The rules for judging are similar to the criteria of the actual show except we're not as critical. This is a great opportunity to offer any tips and critiques on plants entered to give members an idea of what a show plant should embody. Usually the mini shows are judged by the speaker or special guest. We have entry cards similar to the ones for the show.

Entries will be award points based on what "ribbon" they get. 3 for blue, 2 for red, 1 for yellow. Those points will be counted and will be added to each members tally toward prizes that will be awarded at the end of the year. Prizes TBD, but they'll be great!


If you're entering plants, please try to arrive a few minutes early to complete the plant entry cards! And, like the Plant Shoe and Sale, there is a limit of three plants per category.

This month's categories are:

Monstrose Plants:

A monstrose mutation is a genetic disruption of the apical meristem that results in irregular, chaotic, and "freakish" growth. These mutations are often triggered by genetic defects or external damage from insects, disease, or environmental stress.

Key features are unpredictable, sculptural forms and may even lack spines compared to normal plants of the same species, multiple growth points that cluster or are more sporadic.

CCSS Monthly Plant Show (continued)

Crested Plants:

Like monstrose growth, crested or cristate mutations occur for the same reasons. Where these mutations differ is in their form. Due to damage-induced mutation where the plant's growth point (apical meristem) turns into a line, causing stems to fan out, twist, and form brain-like, wavy, or serpentine shapes.

Please note that some times both mutations can occur on the same plant.

Propagation and care:

Since the mutation isn't always passed through seeds, these plants are typically propagated via cloning, such as cuttings or grafting.

These mutations generally do not weaken the plant, usually normal care for the species of plant is advised. Although due to the nature of these forms pest management/mitigation is recommended (mealy bugs love folds and tight spaces). Pruning of reverted "normal" growth is recommended to maintain mutated shape.

Jackson Burkholder Wins!


The Cactus and Succulent Society of America is proud to spotlight board member Jackson F. Burkholder, whose passion for cactus research and plant anatomy continues to enrich both our organization and the broader botanical community.

Jackson recently earned his Master of Science in Biology from Texas State University and received the Outstanding Master's Thesis Award in the Life and Biological Sciences category for his thesis, Comparative Anatomy of Extrafloral Nectaries in the Cactus Family (Cactaceae). His research explored the intricate anatomical structures of extrafloral nectaries within Cactaceae, contributing valuable insight into cactus morphology and function.

Jackson's fascination with plant anatomy began during his undergraduate studies, when he discovered he could combine his love of plants with optics and advanced visual techniques. He is especially drawn to the intricate cellular patterns and minute anatomical details that reveal both the scientific complexity and artistic beauty of plants.

Reflecting on his graduate experience, Jackson emphasizes perseverance and thoroughness in research: even when a project feels overwhelming, dedication leads to a final product you can be proud of. He credits his advisor, David Lemke, Ph.D., for providing both foundational training and the freedom to experiment with new approaches—an experience that strengthened his confidence and adaptability when working with challenging specimens.

We are honored to have Jackson's expertise, curiosity, and commitment to scientific excellence represented on the CSSA Board. His work exemplifies the depth of research and appreciation for plant structure that inspires our community.
